Swarthmore Senior Citizens Association Annual Meeting March 26, 2025

Centennial Room, 129 Park Avenue Swarthmore, PA 19081

Attendance: 38

Marv Gelb played light background piano music as people arrived for the annual meeting and continued through lunch. Lunch was catered by Wayside Market and served by Shirley Mitrovich and Cindi Kruth

President Dan Snyder greeted the seniors and called the meeting to order at 12:30.

There was a moment of silence to remember the seven SSCA members who died since the last meeting.

The minutes from the March 2024 annual meeting were approved.

Dan called attention to committee reports listed in the annual report, commenting that there was a "lot of work and a small board" to do the work.

Treasurer's report: Dan explained that revenue comes from dues, contributions, the Borough grant, and the Zimmer-Willetts Fund.

He expressed sincere appreciation for our Administrator, Stephanie McDonough, and elicited applause for her work.

Sheila Bell was elected to a new three-year term on the board.

Bylaws: Bill Scarborough and Dan have worked on revisions to make them clearer and more flexible. Nancy Daniel moved to approve the revisions; Joel Marcus seconded. The motion carried.

Upcoming events were announced: April 26: PAC Spring Fling; May 18: Rotary Fun Fair, June 4: last Lunch and Learn of the season, June 11: picnic, PAC activities on Wednesdays throughout the summer, July 4: parade, and October 18: Farmer's Market

Stephanie spoke about the history of SSCA and how the borough funding started in 2018. This allowed for expansion of the SSCA programs and hiring of a part-time administrator. All activities are free or low cost, and membership dues are optional and intentionally keep low.

At this point the board is overburdened. It is not an advisory board, but rather a working board, where members actually provide the activities offered to members. We are providing at least the same level of activities as before, but the board now has about half as many members as it once had. Requests for volunteers at meetings have not elicited many helpers. Last year the Strategic Plan identified interesting new

activities, but we do not have enough board members and active volunteers to implement these activities. We need a new approach.

The major options are: (1) maintain or expand programming by being more effective in recruiting volunteers and board members; (2) reduce programming to just core offerings, maintain current number of board members and volunteers, (3) maintain or expand programming via a radical changes in management structure (board becomes advisory, management is outsourced to a new, paid Executive Director, to be funded by much higher dues and/or increased levels of outside support), or (4) continue as we currently are, maintaining current offerings as long as possible, and dwindling support and resources will eventually force a change of some sort. We are currently focussing on option 1.

Betty Dowling asked what were tasks for which volunteers are needed. A few were mentioned, and she was told that a full list would be published via our newsletter. Dan encouraged potential volunteers to speak to any board members to identify tasks that appeal to them.

Nancy commented that board membership was not a long commitment: 3 years

Joel asked where SSCA fits with other senior organizations in the area. Dan mentioned that we are the only one that has a primary focus on seniors, and that all local nonprofits compete for volunteers and board members. Barbara Sorin asked how satisfied are people with what we are doing now; Dan mentioned that verbal feedback, and the survey we did last year for the Strategic Plan indicate that our programs are generally well received. Betty D asked how much money would it take to have more paid leadership, and Dan said we have not gotten that far in planning options.

Nancy announced that she has assurance from Swarthmore Presbyterian that their bus is now available for us to use for trips.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:06.

A catered lunch of sandwiches, salad, dessert, and beverages was provided.

TREASURER

Treasurer: Treasurer Bill Scarborough

Our membership has remained constant between 2024 and 2025, providing total dues to the Association of \$3,165. Those dues do not cover all of our expenses. We pay rent to PAC for the space we use and we have salary expenses for our Administrator, in addition to the cost of providing Lunch & Learns and other activities, such as trips and free lunches, for our members to enjoy. We are fortunate to have an annual grant from the Borough of Swarthmore which helps cover our expenses. However, we still had a deficit of \$5,741.20 which was covered by taking money out of our investment account.

Given our resources we are in a good position to continue our activities in 2026, relying on our savings and the Borough's grant to make up the difference between member contributions and the cost of our programs. The Treasurer reports to the Board at monthly Board meetings.

FINANCE

Dan Snyder

Following this overview and summary you will find independent accountant George Kaffes' Compilation Report which is derived from documentation of our accounts provided to him by our administrator and our treasurer.

Overview: Income for the year 2025 was derived from interest and dividends from Investments, tax m deductible contributions from our membership, a generous grant from the Swarthmore Borough, and support from the community. Volunteer contributions from our membership remain a very important part of our support during the year. SSCA has an invested fund created after a bequest of approximately \$300,000 from the late Irma Zimmer. We continue to maintain our investments at Vanguard, in mutual funds that are balanced to produce growth and preserve capital.

Summary:

Our investment status improved, roughly in line with the generally improving market. Our expenses in 2025 were covered by other income, plus a grant from the Borough. We see no reason to revise our investment strategy at this time. We are confident of our financial situation going forward.


ACCOUNTANT'S COMPILATION REPORT- CASH BASIS

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

President: Dan Snyder

The Board continues to work for the good of not only seniors, but our whole community. 2025 saw the launch of our new website and a new look for SSCA. It has proved to be a dynamic and useful improvement in our face to the community.

One of the highlights of 2025 was our Board Retreat and Volunteer Information Day in August. Volunteers are the heart of our organization, and we were able to match roles and people to make SSCA even more successful.

The Board continues to seek areas of collaboration with other local organizations. This year we worked with the Park Avenue Community Center, the Swarthmore Public Library, the Swarthmore Rotary Club, Wallingford-Swarthmore Community Classes, the Imagine Swarthmore Steering Committee, the Swarthmore United Methodist Church, The Schoolhouse Senior Center, and Surrey Services' Media Senior Center.

We are again grateful to the Borough of Swarthmore for providing financial support for our programs.

We owe a huge amount of gratitude for the tireless work and energy of our Board. We continue to be grateful for the talents, energy and resourcefulness of Stephanie McDonough, our Administrator. She handles most of the Lunch and Learn programming and the SSCA Travels. Stephanie also helps us with our finances, and communications and relations with the other organizations in town.

MEMBERSHIP

SSCA ended 2025 with a total of 231 members. Although our membership is down somewhat from its peak during the pandemic, we are pleased that we have significantly more members now than we did before the pandemic (we had 179 members at the end of 2019, versus the 241 we had at the end of 2024). We gained new members and friends through old members who brought their friends, through our own weekly online Newsletter and The Swarthmorean's weekly Calendar of Events, and through referrals from Park Avenue Community Center and from the Swarthmore Library. Our annual booth at the local Farmers' Market offers a visible presence for people of all ages to learn of our continuing presence and service in the community.

This year the Membership Committee concentrated on polling and engaging members in leading and organizing SSCA activities of particular interest to them. Written "job descriptions" and flexible "terms of service" involved a broader volunteer base among members, a successful effort which we look forward to expanding.

We welcome the general public to participate in SSCA activities and projects and appreciate the opportunity to welcome "future seniors" into membership.

PERSONNEL

The Committee makes recommendations to the full Board regarding contracted personnel. There were two contracted personnel in 2025: Our Administrator, Stephanie McDonough and our website maintainer, Kel Kyle. Committee members are Sheila Bell and Shirley Mitrovich, in addition to the Chair.

COMMUNICATIONS

Chair: Jo Ellis

The aim of SSCA communications is to keep both seniors and the wider community informed about the activities and impact of the Swarthmore Senior Citizens Association. SSCA works to be a dynamic presence in our community, one that is acknowledged and appreciated for the benefits it provides to all residents of the Borough.

The weekly e-newsletter remains our most prominent communication tool, reaching over 700 inboxes every Monday morning. It's sent to seniors, Borough officials, Community Directory contacts, and others interested in our programs. Beyond showcasing our activities, the newsletter also highlights a range of local opportunities and news, including updates on Park Avenue Community Center events, Rotary initiatives, Borough happenings, and library updates.

In late fall 2024, we began a project to update and revitalize our website, SwarthmoreSeniors.com. It was an opportunity to refresh the design and improve the user experience of the site, making it more engaging and useful to our community. The new website launched in early Spring 2025, with a new look and more dynamic feel, thanks to the volunteer efforts of web-developer, Kel Kyle. Kel remains as a contractor for updates and maintenance to the website.

WELLNESS

Chair: Sheila Bell

In 2025 the Wellness Committee continued to offer half-day workshops on topics that appeal to seniors and the larger community. In January Jim Srdenschek from WSFS bank presented a well-received talk on financial frauds and scams and how to avoid being a victim. We offered a box lunch after the morning presentation. In October and November we had four Friday afternoon workshops on different aspects of wellness featuring hands-on experiences. Elizabeth Streit (chair zumba), Judy MacRone (strength, balance, and flexibility), Shirley Mitrovich (fall-themed craft), and Jane Bunting (mindfulness and meditation) were the presenters. Participants were encouraged to stay afterwards for refreshments and to discuss the programs with the presenters.

WALKS AND TRAILS

Co-Chairs: Beth Lawn and Dan Snyder

Beth Lawn worked with Dan Snyder to plan and lead walks in the first few months of 2025, with Beth taking the lead in the Fall. We continued to use SSCA's self-guided walks and took informal strolls around town and campus. September saw two special treats, a guided walk in Scott Arboretum to explore its Heritage Trees, and a walk on the Battery Park Trail along the Delaware River in New Castle, DE. Among other outings, we enjoyed both guided and self-led walks in two Natural Lands Preserves and took advantage of already-planned-open-to-the-public walks at Pendle Hill and Scott Arboretum. We had 16 walks in 2025, averaging about 7 people per walk.

The resources SSCA created in 2020 to facilitate taking local self-guided walks continue to be available in three ways: as laminated map cards that can be checked out from the Swarthmore Public Library, as maps that can be downloaded and printed from the Borough website, and in the AllTrails app.

TRAVELS

Administrator: Stephanie McDonough

SSCA Travels is still struggling to re-establish regular trips. The church van is less available

and carpooling is logistically challenging. We love trips and know our members do too, so we're working on it! Thank you to our members, Beth Lawn, Darleen Walling, and Zu de Gain, who organized a fun trip to H-Mart for shopping and lunch.

TECH HELP DESK

Chair: Dan Snyder

We have been providing free tech help for anyone requesting it since 2022. We mostly meet in person at the PAC Center, the Swarthmore Public Library or in the home. Requests are usually for help learning how to use a device, or to solve a tech problem. Most requests are for help with Apple devices, which Dan Snyder addresses; Valentina Crosson joined the Help Desk in 2025 and helps those using Windows devices. Help sessions typically last ½ to 1 hour, but sometimes are as brief as showing someone how to accomplish a task on their iPhone while in an aisle at the Coop. Senior Activities at the Park Avenue Community Center

The Park Avenue Community (PAC) Center is our space in Swarthmore. Most of our in-person activities happen there. The PAC Center maintains an open door policy and warmly welcomes Seniors and Delaware County residents of all ages to visit its facilities during weekdays from 9:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. In addition to SSCA-sponsored activities, there are many classes, lectures, concerts, and other opportunities for our members to engage with the community. SSCA is a Founding Partner of the PAC Center.

LUNCH AND LEARN

Our signature program, Lunch and Learn, is a weekly highlight for members. We enthusiastically welcome presenters, performers, and leaders. 2025 highlights include: all kind of history from Delco to Nova Scotia and from Revolutionary Times to now, musical performances from soloist to large groups, local politicians and civil servants, plus art activities, science, and laughter yoga.

CULINARY HELP DESK

Chair: Cindi Kruth

Cindi Kruth and Shirley Mitrovich plan and provide the lunches at our weekly Lunch and Learns. Cindi has academic and professional experience in food preparation. This year she started making her expertise available to the community through her Culinary Help Desk. WEB WANDERING

In 2023 we started a series of year-round, every-other-week informal gatherings at the PAC Center to enjoy lunch with recorded shows or presentations on a wide variety of topics. In 2025 Attendees at each session choose the topic for the next session. Highlights of 2024 included The Great Experiment (Philadelphia history), Nova: Bird Brain, and Flyboys: The Tuskegee Airmen. We enjoyed 10 sessions in 2025; the topics are shown in Appendix B.

Our games groups continue with their enthusiastic participation in 2025. Our established bridge tables continue to play regularly. Mah Jongg added a second session each week.
